SHOPS are coming to Warralily.

The first sod was turned at the \$100 million commercial precinct in Armstrong Creek yesterday.

Woolworths is set to be the anchor tenant of the precinct, which is to be called Warralily Village.

About 200 jobs will be created to build the mix of specialty shops, cafes, office spaces, school and sports facilities for the growth hub.

Woolworths regional property manager John Robinson said the company had committed millions to the Geelong region.

"We are fully committed to the Geelong area having recently invested \$2 million to refurbish our Corio supermarket, and welcoming our first customers to the \$22 million development in Curlewis and the \$20.5 million development in Barrabool Hills," Mr Robinson said.

The Armstrong Creek store's construction is to start next April, and finish in the second half of 2017.

Cr Lyons lauded the ongoing development of Armstrong Creek.

"Warralily is just a great venient," Ms Zabriskie said.

Data shows work on house and unit renovations and building across Geelong has grown almost \$50 million across the past two financial years.
