

Enjoying Your Dog in Public Places

The Geelong region is home to hundreds of walking tracks, parks and recreation reserves where people can take their dogs.

All public open spaces in the City of Greater Geelong (CoGG) have been designated as being 'on-leash' for the purposes of dogs, except where otherwise signed. There are currently no 'off- leash' areas at Warralily. The great news is that there are plenty of places in Geelong where you can take your dog off-leash, as long as they are under your direct supervision. The problem with dogs is......

Some dog droppings contain harmful bacteria and nutrients. They can be washed through the stormwater system into natural waterways which may contribute to excessive E. coli pollution readings on beaches following heavy rainfalls.

Toxocara Canis is the roundworm that can be found in the faeces of infected puppies or adult dogs, and can be passed onto humans. Children, people with compromised immune systems and field sports players are most at risk of infection.

The City of Greater Geelong requires dog owners to remove and dispose of their dog's poo when in public places. You can be fined for not complying. Unremoved dog poo can influence decisions to ban dogs from certain parks or beaches.

How to clean up after your dog

- Cleaning up after your dog is easy. You can use plastic (or biodegradable) bags, trowels or pooper scoopers. Products are available that attach to your dog's leash to store plastic bags for use during walks.
- Keep your bags/pouches/pooper scoop products with your leash, as a reminder to always take them with you.
- If using the plastic bag method, simply put your hand inside the bag, pick up the dog poo, turn the bag inside out, then seal. You can tie the bag to your leash or carry it until you get to an appropriate disposal site.

Call for Volunteers to Help the Endangered Hooded Plover.

BirdLife Australia's Friends of the Hooded Plover groups are looking for interested people to volunteer for the next summer's Hooded Plover monitoring season.

Hooded Plovers are non-aggressive, small, timid birds that live only on the coast on sandy surf beaches. Hooded Plovers are a threatened species in Victoria, and face a tough battle to increase their numbers due to their exposed beach nest sites and difficulty raising chicks.

Each summer Hooded Plovers attempt to breed on beaches from Breamlea to Point Lonsdale on the Bellarine, and along the Surf Coast.

To assist the Hoodies during the summer months volunteers are needed to help with monitoring the birds and chicks, reporting when the birds are nesting, and educating beach users about the birds and the threats that they face.

Bird Life will provide training in August this year for people interested in assisting with the volunteer program. The contribution of each volunteer is flexible, it can be for as short or

as long a period as is possible for each volunteer. Attending the training in August does not commit you to volunteering in summer.

Last breeding season four Hooded Plover chicks were raised successfully at three locations on the Bellarine. A small group of volunteers were dedicated in giving up their time to help the chicks fledge, in amongst the many people enjoying the beach.

It's important to realise Hooded Plovers are not Spur Winged Plovers, who swoop during Spring and are often found nesting in parks and reserves, roundabouts and other grassy areas.

Smoke Free Children's Recreational Areas

From 1 April, under the Tobacco Act 1987 smoking is prohibited within 10 metres of outdoor public children's playground equipment, skate parks and sporting venues, during organised underage sporting events, as well as in the outdoor areas of public swimming pools.

Where does the ban apply? Children's playground equipment may include an individual piece of equipment as well as clusters of playground equipment, such as climbing frames, swings and slides.

The ban applies to outdoor dining and drinking areas within 10 metres of outdoor children's playground equipment.

What penalties might apply? The penalty for someone breaking one of these laws is \$144.36.

- Sign posting areas.


Neighbourhood watch signs will be installed around the community so everyone who comes into our community can see that Warralily is a place where neighbours watch out for each other.

The Wild White Man William Buckley

The man known as the 'Wild White Man' was born William Buckley, in Macclesfield, England, in 1780. As a young man he worked briefly as an apprentice bricklayer, but soon joined the army and became a respected soldier.

However, his military career came to an abrupt end in 1802, when he was accused of theft and sentenced to 14 years in the convict colony of Australia.

In October 1803, Buckley arrived at the convict settlement near Sorrento, on the ship Calcutta. However, a lack of fresh water and difficult conditions made the settlement a horrendous place, and many convicts attempted escape. Buckley was one of the few that succeeded.

On Christmas Eve 1803 – knowing that the officers had been drinking and would be less alert than usual - some of the convicts stole a kettle, a gun, boots and medical supplies. At 9pm, the group made its escape.

Buckley and his companions made slow progress on foot but managed to walk all the way around Port Phillip Bay. They survived on shellfish and succulent plants when they could find them. But hunger and fear wore down Buckley's companions, who soon decided to return to Sullivan Bay. Buckley stayed behind and continued his journey alone until he reached the area near Barwon Heads.

Roughly a year after he escaped from the convict settlement at Sullivan Bay, William Buckley met two Aboriginal women from the Wathaurung people. The women thought Buckley was the reincarnated spirit of their kinsman – possibly because Buckley was carrying his spear which he had found near the Indigenous man's burial mound.

The women took Buckley back to their camp, where he lived for the next 32 years. He became a respected member of the Wathaurung community, with Aborigines from other areas even recognising him as one of the Wathaurung tribe. He learnt to hunt and gather food, and was a local expert when it came to fishing. During his time with the Wathaurung people, William Buckley lived in the dunes around Breamlea where many significant cultural heritage places, including aboriginal middens remain - the surrounding landscape once provided a large variety of seafood from the ocean and intertidal areas and plant food from the saltmash, wetlands and

In accounts of his life, Buckley often talked about catching eels near his hut. A waterfall and a bay near Barwon Heads are named after him, and tourists still visit one of the caves where he lived almost 200 years ago, under the lighthouse at Point Lonsdale.

In 1835, William Buckley came across John Batman and his exploration party at Indented Head. He had been living with the Wathaurung Aboriginal community for 32 years, but left them to join the settlers.

Buckley worked in Melbourne as a labourer, building Batman's house on the hill where Southern Cross Station is today. He also became an interpreter and mediator between Europeans and Indigenous people.

In 1936 he acted as a guide and interpreter for a European expedition, along Lake Connewarre and the Barwon River, to the township of Geelong.

Buckley left the colony after only two years, arriving in Hobart Town in early 1838. He married widow Julia Eagers in 1840, and lived a relatively quiet life until his death in 1856.

Home Fire Safety:
